

Since 2012, Rubis Mécénat has been integrating professionally young adults from the township of Thokoza and its surroundings, in South Africa, using the practice of photography as a tool for emancipation and commitment for a future career.

Of Soul and Joy extends its support by providing young photographers with trainings (literacy, computer science, lifeskills, etc.) and access to a network of key cultural players on the local and international scene – a tailor-made support for the emergence of a new generation of South African photographers and for their professional careers.

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Each year, the programme awards scholarships to its most promising young photographers to access higher education in photography at a university of their choice, including the Market Photo Workshop in Johannesburg.

Of Soul and Joy is an arts initiative to think about humanity, freedom, and the play of making. Moreover, it inspires the possibility that photography has the potential to also celebrate our existence, spirituality, and creativity.

OFF-SITE PHOTOGRAPHY WORKSHOPS


the project takes its workshops on the road to disadvantaged, rural communities in order to reach population groups that have little access to art, and actively works with institutions and collectives to organise off-site photography workshops.



More than 100 young photographers have been given the chance to experience photography as a way of making, of looking, of thinking. High school students and young adults from Thokoza, a township southeast of Johannesburg have had the opportunity to work with photographers as their mentors through workshops, ongoing encounters with arts practitioners, exposure to artistic institutions and events. In time, this cohort of photographers has become a community more and more visible, in South Africa, on the continent, and internationally.

Sibusiso Bheka is Of Soul and Joy project assistant. He is represented since 2020 by the Afronova gallery (Johannesburg).


Born in 1997 in Thokoza, Sibusiso Bheka joined the Of Soul and Joy project in 2012 and graduated in photography from Vaal University of Technology in 2018. His work has been shown many times in South Africa and internationally (International Festival of Gand, Turbine Art Fair, Johannesburg Art Gallery, Addis Foto Fest, Bamako Encounters, Cape Town Art Fair, Constitution Hill, etc.) In 2018, he was a finalist for the Photography and Social Justice grant of Magnum Fondation and he was nominated in 2019 for the CAP Prize. In 2022, he goes to Amsterdam, Netherlands, for a residency with the NOOR agency.

Hlatshwayo is a fellow of the 2019 Gisèle Wulfsohn Mentorship in photography of the Market Photo Workshop, from which he graduated in 2018, and benefits within this frame of the mentorship of John Fleetwood, curator and founder of the Photo: plateform, and presented his work in a solo show at the Market Photo Workshop in 2020. In 2019, he was awarded the prestigious CAP Prize and his Slaghuis series was featured in the group exhibition 'Before the Night' at Fotomuseum Winterthur, Switzerland. In 2020, Thembinkosi Hlatshwayo exhibited his work at the Investec Cape Town Art Fair with the Of Soul and Joy project. In 2021, he participated in the group exhibition Inganekwane at Constitution Hill (Johannesburg, 2021) and NWU Gallery (Potchefstroom, 2022). In 2022, he exhibited at the PhotoSaintGermain festival (Paris) with the South African photographer Jabulani Dhlamini, as well as at the Goethe Institute (Johannesburg), where he exhibited work from his Umnyakazo series, and participated in the 13th Rencontres de Bamako (Mali).

Of Soul and Joy photographer since 2012, Tshepiso Mazibuko graduated from the Market Photo Workshop in 2016, where she teaches from time to time. Her work has been shown numerous times in South Africa and internationally (Paris Photo, Ghent Photo Festival, Turbine Art Fair, Johannesburg Art Gallery, Addis Foto Fest, Cape Town Art Fair, etc.). She is a recipient of the Tierney Fellowship 2017 and received the Prince Claus Fund Award in 2018. She joins the Umhlabathi collective in 2021. Lindokuhle Sobekwa


Introduced to photography with Of Soul and Joy in 2012, Lindokuhle Sobekwa is an associate member of Magnum Photos since 2019. Born in 1995 in Katlehong, Johannesburg, Lindokuhle Sobekwa lives and works in Thokoza. In 2017, he receives the Magnum Photography and Social Justice scholarship, with the support of his two mentors and active members of the project Bieke Depoorter and Mikhael Subotzky, both members of Magnum Photos. In 2018, he is awarded anew by the Magnum Foundation for Nyaope, a series tackling drug use in South African townships. Since 2012, his works have been shown in South Africa, France, Netherlands, Norway and Iran. His photographic series *Daleside*, commissioned by Rubis Mécénat and developed between 2015 and 2020 with the French photographer Cyprien Clément-Delmas, was presented in 2021 at the PhotoSaintGermain festival (Paris) and published in a catalogue by Gost Books. In 2022, he is one of the mentors of the Re-presenting the Archive project run by Magnum Photos in South Africa. In 2023, he won the inaugural John Kobal Foundation Award.


Vuyo Mabheka

He has participated in the group exhibitions *In Thokoza: Place of Peace* at Stop Sign Gallery (Johannesburg, 2019), *Inganekwane* at Constitution Hill (Johannesburg, 2021) and NWU Gallery (Potchefstroom, 2022) and *uHambo* (Umhlabathi Gallery, Johannesburg 2022). In 2023, he is awarded the Images Vevey Special Jury Prize with his *Popihuise* series. He is represented since 2022 by the Afronova gallery (Johannesburg).

JABULANI DHLAMINI



Jabulani Dhlamini (born in 1983 in Warden, Free State, South Africa) is a South African photographer who lives and works in Johannesburg. n 2011, Dhlamini graduated from the Market Photo Workshop in documentary photography and was a fellow of the the Edward Ruiz Mentorship. His Umama series was exhibied at the Market Photo Workshop in 2012, and at Goodman Gallery Cape Town in 2013. His Recaptured series, exhibited at Goodman

Gallery in 2016 is a project conducted over several years with the Sharpeville community, around the massacre that occurred in the township in 1960. In 2018, his work was shown in the group exhibition Five Photographers, A Tribute to David Goldblatt at the Gerard Sakoto Gallery at the Alliance Française of Johannesburg, and 36 37 in 2019 at the Centro Cultural Franco-Mozambicano (Mozambique), National Arts Festival and Durban Art Gallery (South Africa), and the Bamako Encounters (Mali). In 2020, he co-founded the Umhlabathi collective which brings together 8 South African artists and photographers.

Dhlamini's work focuses on his upbringing, as well as the way he views contemporary South Africa. Since 2014, he is an active mentor of the Of Soul and Joy project and became project manager in 2015. He is represented by the Goodman Gallery, South Africa.

CONTEXT

RUBIS MÉCÉNAT'S SOCIO-CULTURAL PROGRAMMES

Educational and social programmes to integrate underprivileged youth through artistic creation in South Africa and Jamaica, and through social design in Madagascar.

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Rubis Mécénat develops ongoing humanitarian, educational and social projects intended to help young people from disadvantaged communities find a vocation through artistic and cultural practice and design.

There are currently three ongoing programmes in South Africa, Jamaica and Madagascar, which aim to make a lasting contribution to the training and support of these young people towards meaningful employment by using art and design as a means of empowerment and positive engagement.

These projects are driven by the desire to make a long-term contribution to developing the local communities in which the Rubis Group operates, by using artistic practice and design as a tool for emancipation.





RUBIS MÉCÉNAT RUBIS GROUP ENDOWMENT FUND FOR COMMITED ARTISTIC AND SOCIAL PROJECTS

Rubis Mécénat is an endowment fund created by the Rubis Group in 2011. Its purpose is, on the one hand, to support emerging contemporary creation in France through aid for artistic production and, on the other hand, to develop humanitarian, educational and social projects with a long-term vocation, aimed at the professional integration of young people from underprivileged backgrounds through artistic practice in some of the countries in which the Group is established.
