




KINGSTON, JAMAICA Since 2015

For nearly 10 years, Rubis Mécénat has been supporting young adults from the volatile communities of Kingston in jamaica, using artistic practice as a positive means of expression and personal development.

InPulse has been such an important programme to our art ecosystem. Students join the programme at a pivotal point in their lives when they have an interest in art but have uncertainties about it, and the programme in turn helps to nurture and encourage their interests.

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For nearly 10 years, InPulse has been striving to sustainably promote the personal and professional development of young adults from the local communities of Kingston, in Jamaica, by opening up fresh prospects for them through artistic practice, and by giving them keys to develop and progress in an environment prone to instability and precariousness.

The young people involved in the InPulse programme receive intensive training in the field of the visual arts, with additional input from a network of professionals. Each year, the programme awards scholarships to the most promising students to allow them to pursue college studies at Kingston's arts university, the Edna Manley College of the Visual and Performing Arts.

ACTORS **ARTISTS' PORTRAITS**



In 2018, he received a scholarship to study at the Edna Manley College of the Visual and Performing Arts, from which he graduated in 2022. His current work focuses on the creation of kites, and exploring their capacity to metaphorically reflect human emotions. He has exhibited his work in Jamaica and abroad on several occasions and took part in documenta 15 (Kassel, Germany, 2022), as part of the InPulse project.

Demar Brackenridge (born 2003) is a Jamaican artist, who has been a beneficiary of the InPulse project since 2015. In 2018, he received a scholarship to study at the Edna Manley College of the Visual and Performing Arts, from which he graduated with a Fine Arts degree in painting in 2022. His work focuses on painting, drawing, textiles and installations, where he uses architecture to talk about social inequalities. He has exhibited his work in Jamaica and abroad on several occasions and took part in documenta 15 (Kassel, Germany, 2022), as part of the InPulse project.



Jordan Harrison (born 1995) is a Jamaican artist. He has been an InPulse beneficiary since 2015 and is project assistant to Camille Chedda. In 2016, he received a scholarship to study at the Edna Manley College of the Visual and Performing Arts, from which he graduated in 2018. His work focuses on social, economic and political issues, as well as the things that go unsaid concerning these subjects. He has exhibited his work in Jamaica on several occasions and has created a number of murals in Kingston.



CAMILLE CHEDDA

Camille Chedda (born in 1985 in Manchester, Jamaica) is a Jamaican visual artist who utilizes drawing, painting, collage and installation to explore ideas around race and post-colonial identity.

She graduated from the Edna Manley College in Painting and received a Master from the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth. She also presented her works in important exhibitions such as Materializing Slavery, New Roots at the National Gallery of Jamaica and during the Jamaica Biennial in 2014. She is the recipient of numerous awards including the Albert Huie Award, the Reed Foundation Scholarship and the inaugural Dawn Scott Memorial Award She has been an artist in residence at Alice Yard (Trinidad), Art Omi (New York) and Hospitalfield (Scotland). In 2020, she created with 5 Jamaican artists the series of exhibitions ... and I resumed the struggle at the Olympia Gallery (Kingston) in order to present the works of young graduates of Edna Manley and more established artists. CONTEXT

RUBIS MÉCÉNAT'S SOCIO-CULTURAL PROGRAMMES

Educational and social programmes to integrate underprivileged youth through artistic creation in South Africa and Jamaica, and through social design in Madagascar.

Rubis Mécénat develops ongoing humanitarian, educational and social projects intended to help young people from disadvantaged communities find a vocation through artistic and cultural practice and design.

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There are currently three ongoing programmes in South Africa, Jamaica and Madagascar, which aim to make a lasting contribution to the training and support of these young people towards meaningful employment by using art and design as a means of empowerment and positive engagement.

> These projects are driven by the desire to make a long-term contribution to developing the local communities in which the Rubis Group operates, by using artistic practice and design as a tool for emancipation.

Rubis Mécénat is an endowment fund created by the Rubis Group in 2011. Its purpose is, on the one hand, to support emerging contemporary creation in France through aid for artistic production and, on the other hand, to develop humanitarian, educational and social projects with a long-term vocation, aimed at the professional integration of young people from underprivileged backgrounds through artistic practice in some of the countries in which the Group is established.
